## H.Res.517 - Slavery Remembrance Day

- This resolution, passed on July 27<sup>th</sup> supports the establishment of a Slavery Remembrance Day on August 20<sup>th</sup> each year.
  - Unlike 9/11, Pearl Harbor, and the Holocaust there is no Remembrance Day for Slavery.
  - August 20<sup>th</sup> was chosen to commemorate the day the first slave ship, the White Lion, arrived in the English-speaking American colonies at Point Comfort VA, near what is today called Norfolk.
  - Unlike Juneteenth, Slavery Remembrance Day is intended to be a day to commemorate the victims of slavery instead of celebrating its end.
